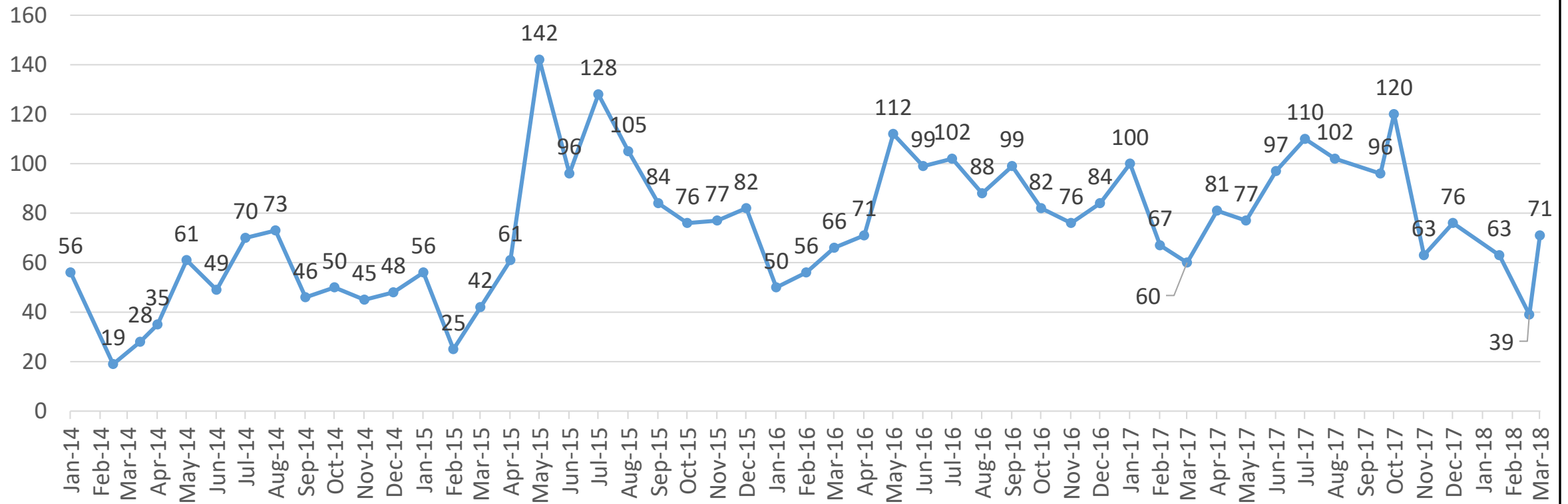

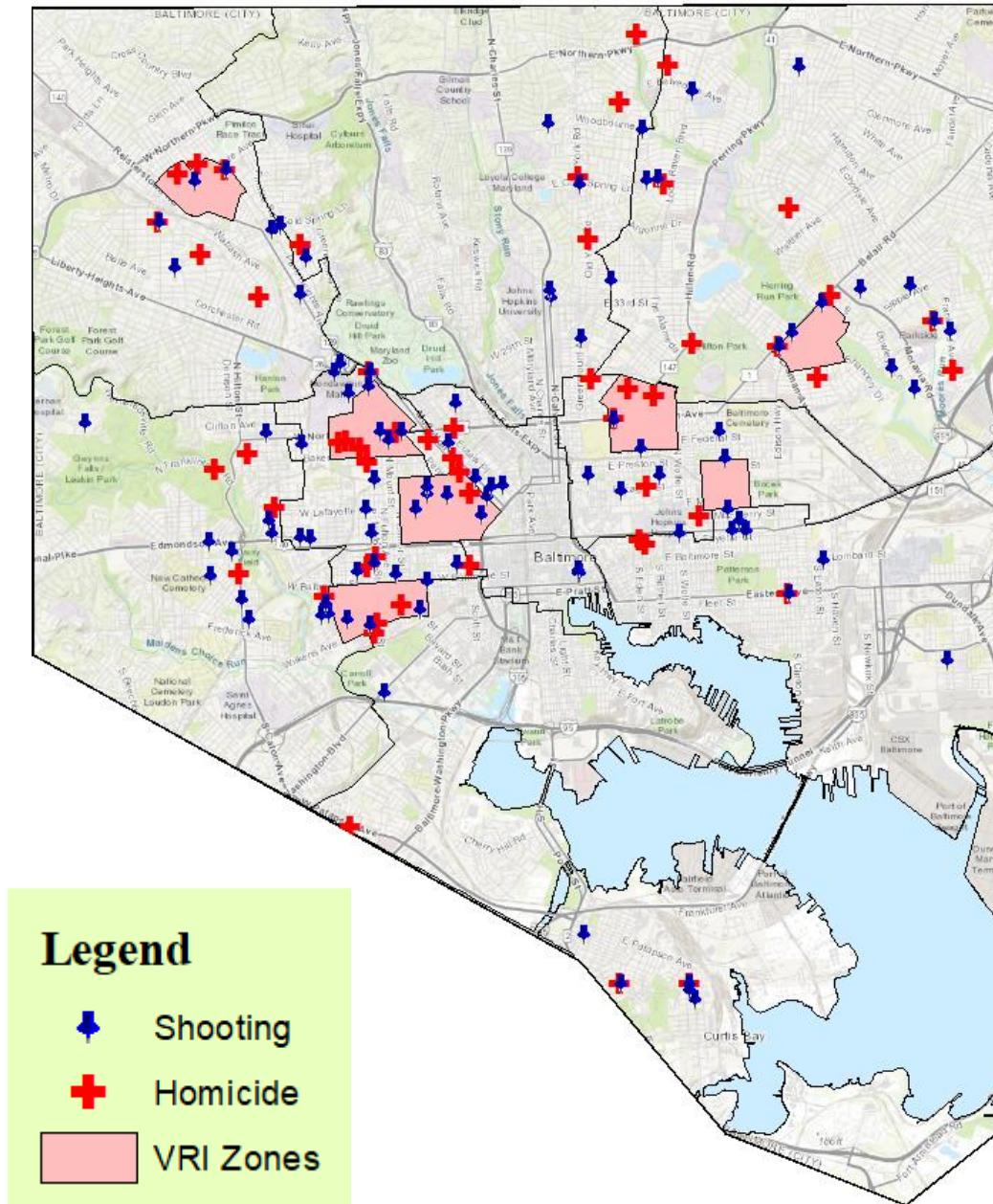

Jan 2014 - Mar 2018

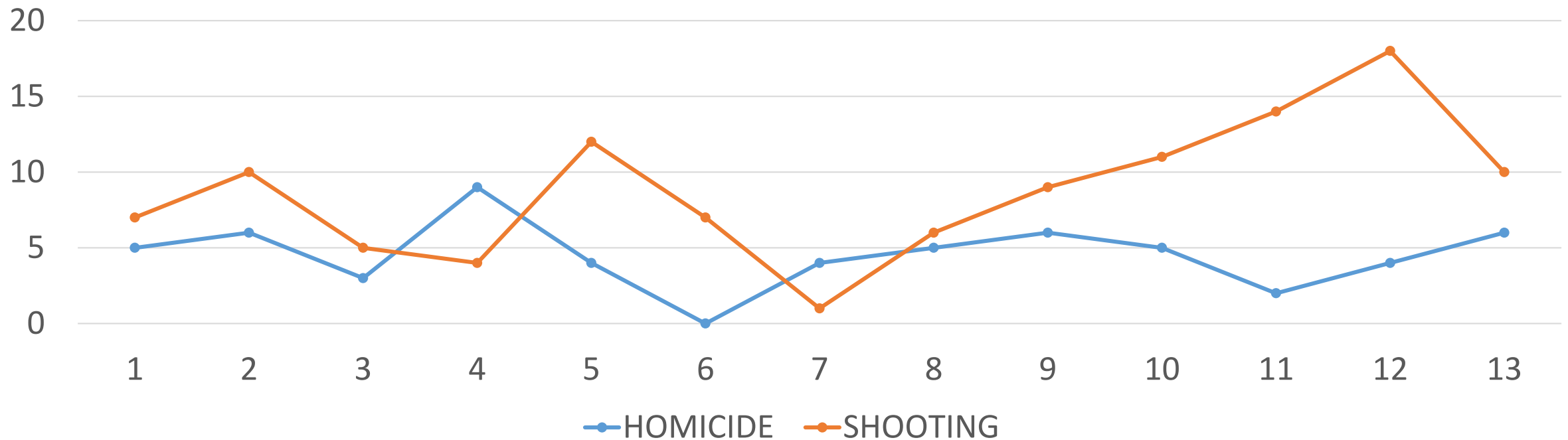


# YTD HOMICIDES & NON-FATAL SHOOTINGS (1/1-3/31)



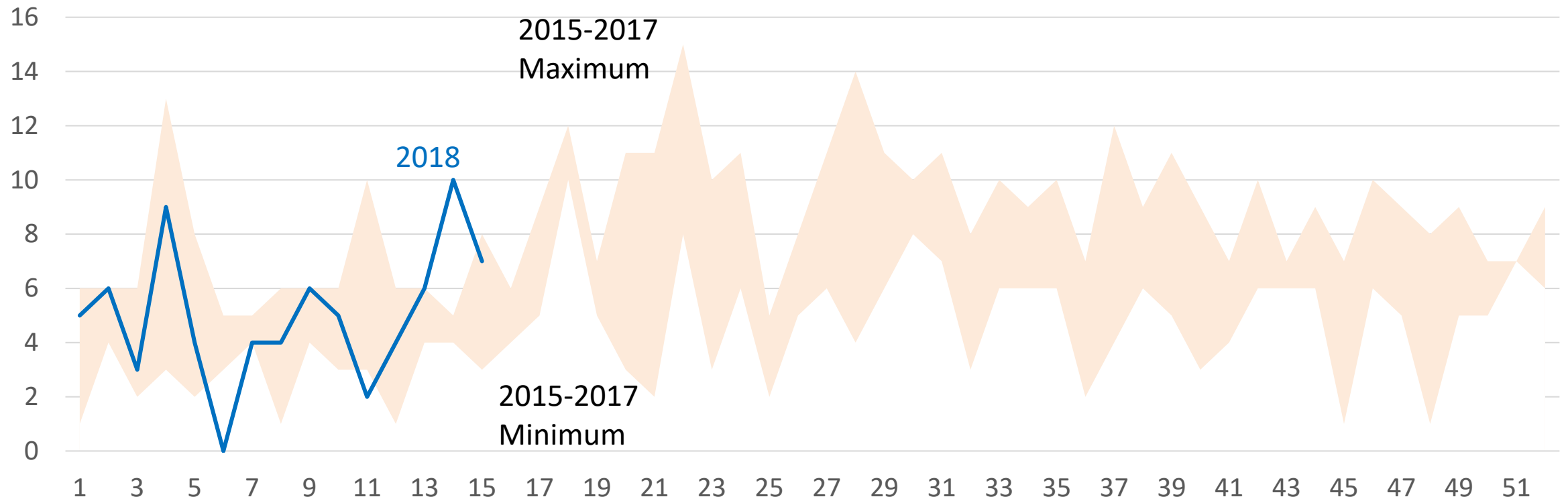

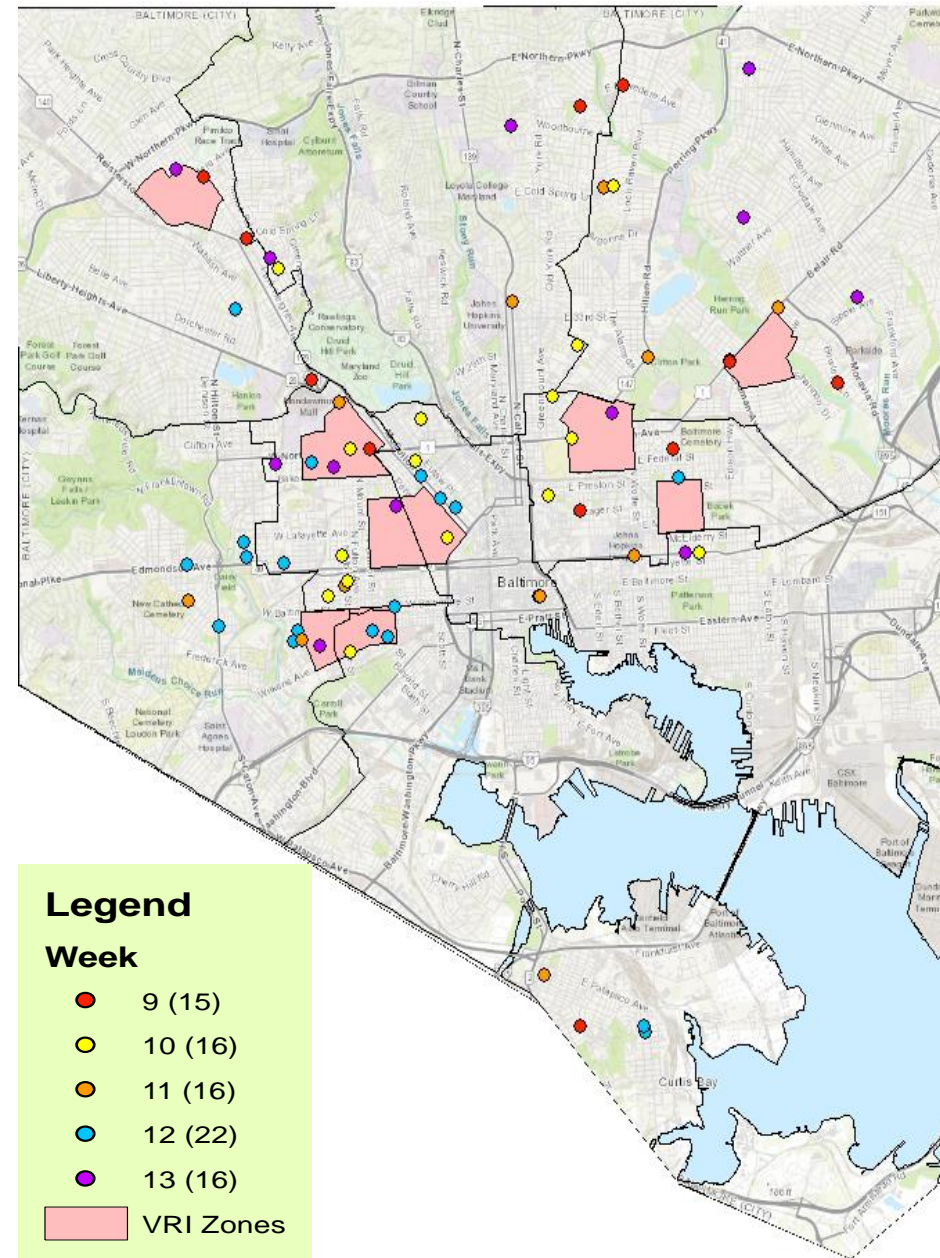

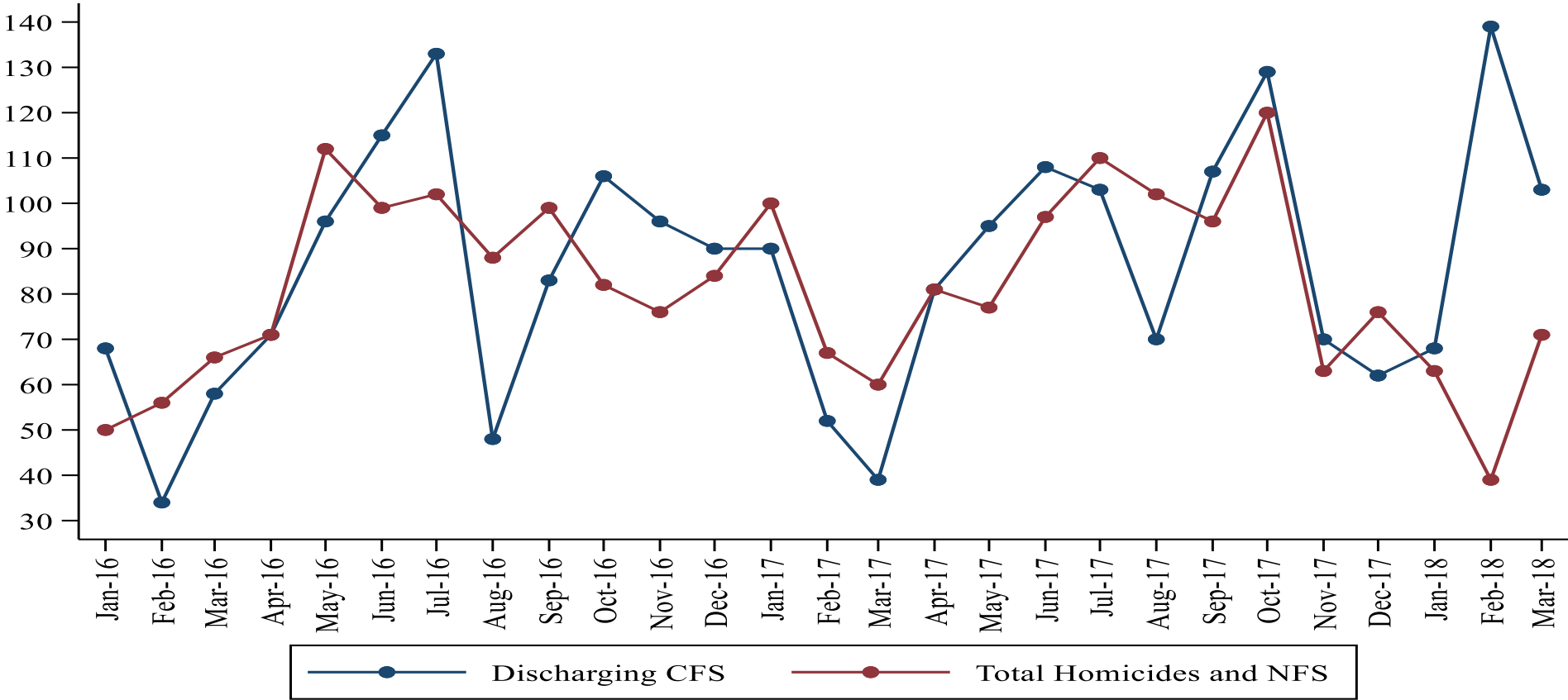

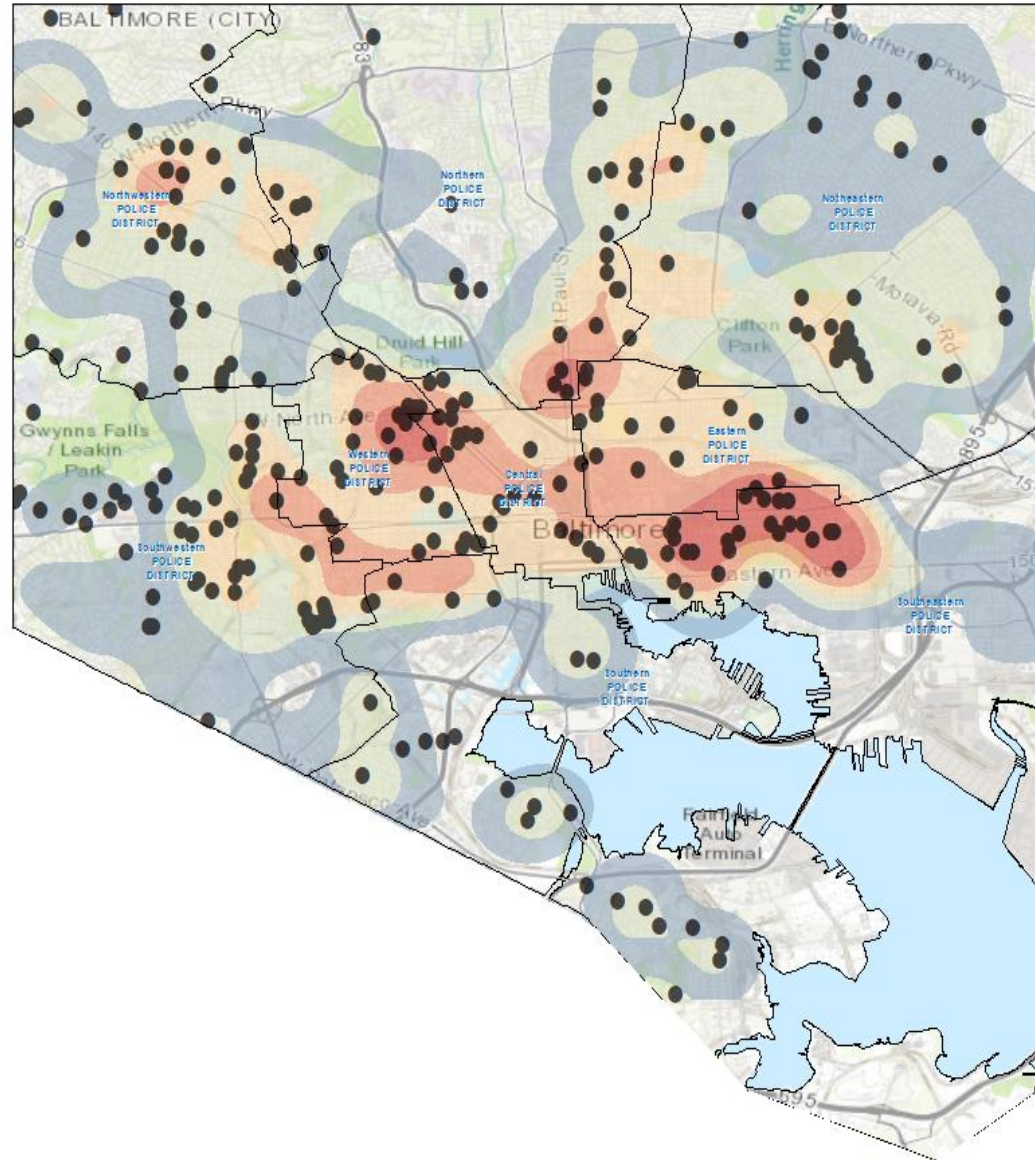

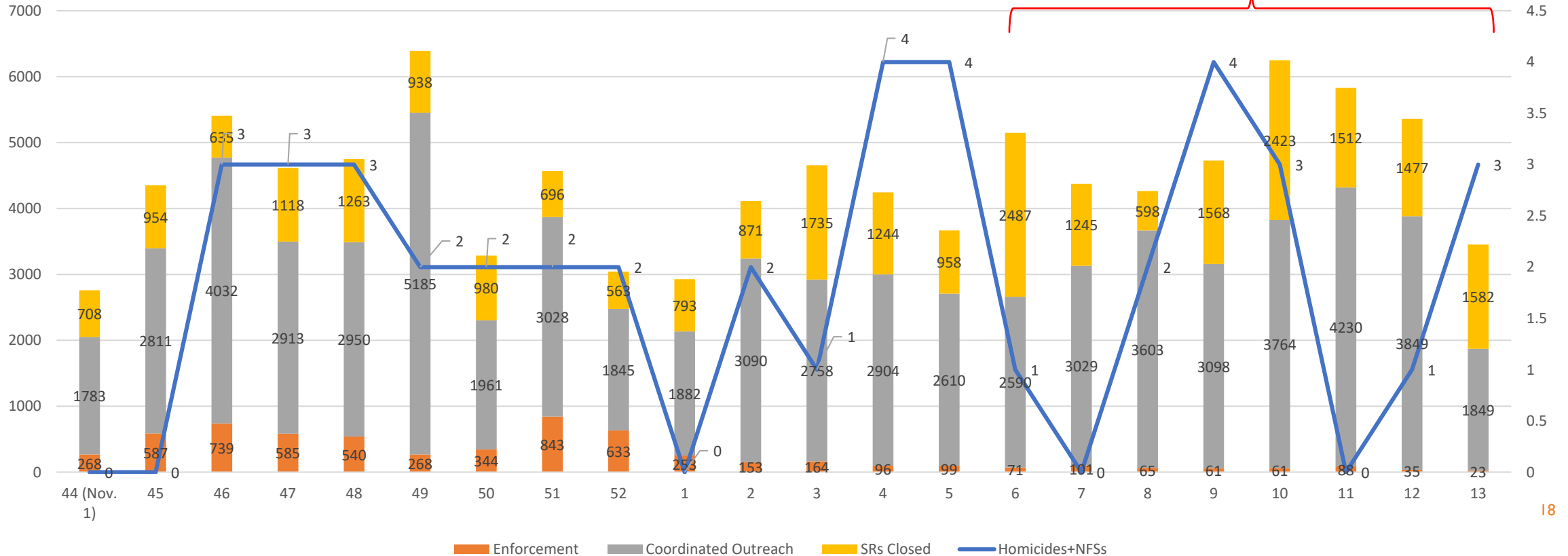

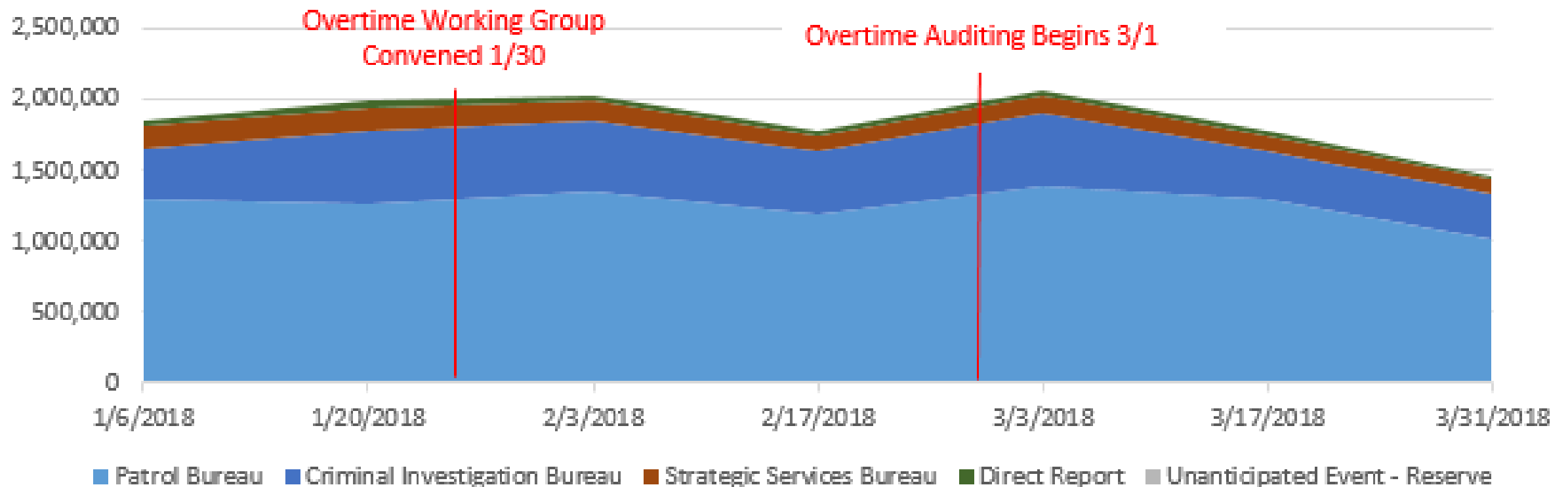

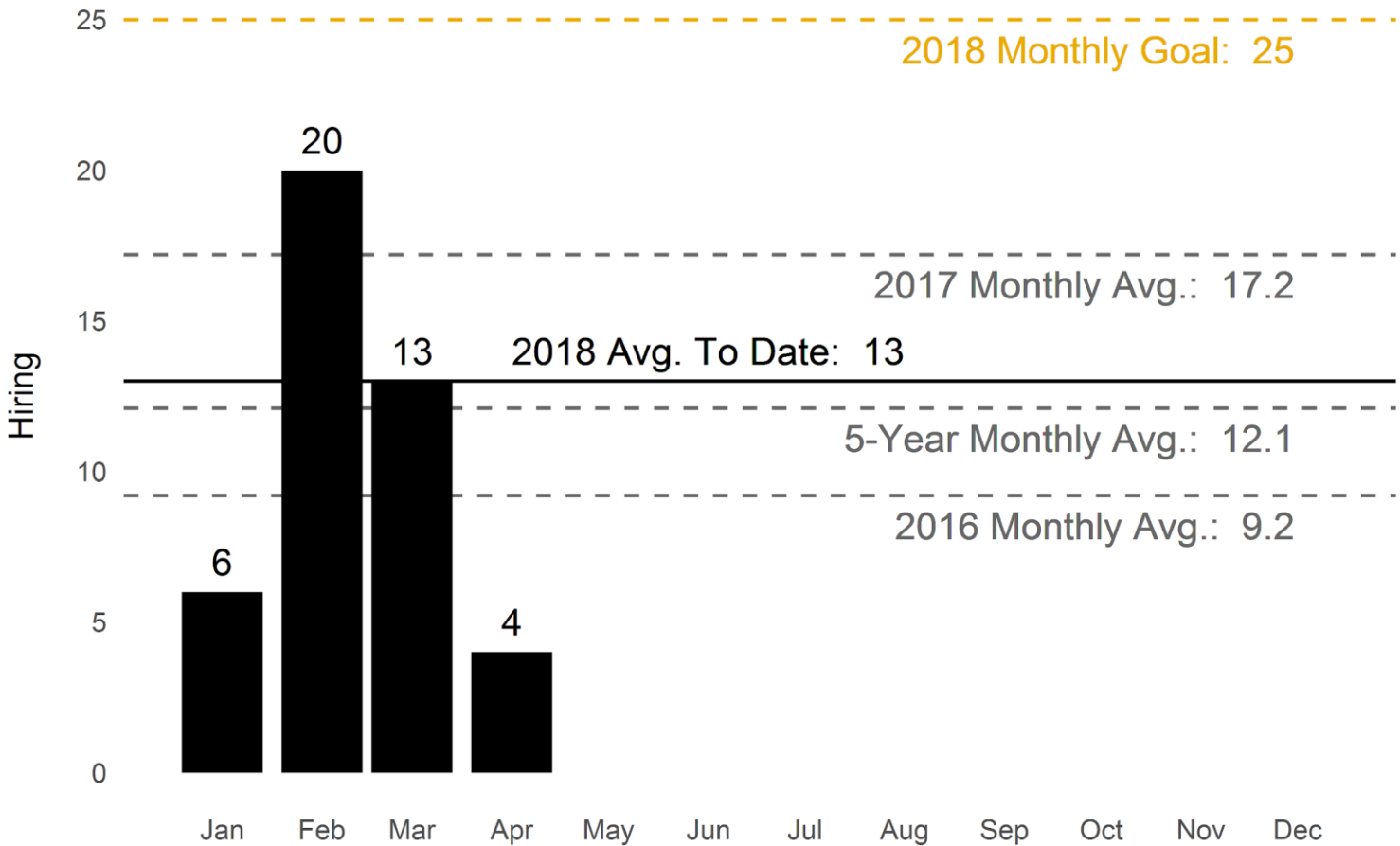

BPD FY18 Overtime Spending, Pay Periods 14-20



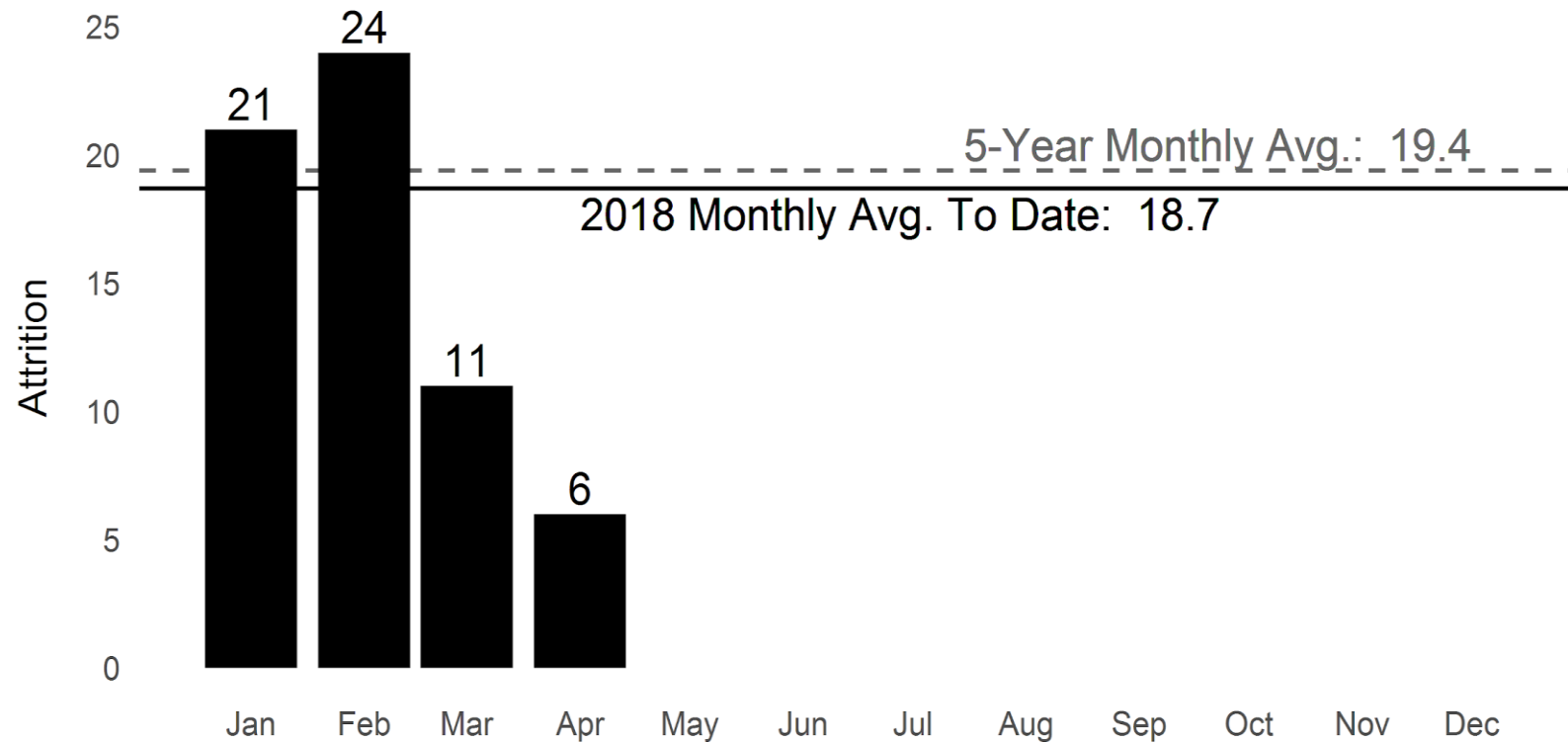
